



Community Engagement

The main focus of community engagement this year has been to work on our strategic priority of creating welcoming, safe spaces for all. To do this we've been looking inward and outward. We have been making strides in staff development, guided by the Equity, Diversity, and Inclusion Action adopted by the Board in 2021; staff have independently completed two courses, we held an all-staff training session, and more courses are now in progress.

Community-focused engagement saw us participating in new leisure-based programming ventures, with Scrabble and chess clubs being established at two locations. We have also hosted several learning opportunities for adults this year, with highlights including an environmental series in Bridgewater, a local history series in Liverpool, and creative arts programming in Lunenburg.

Our premier community event, the Lunenburg Lit Festival, was somewhat derailed by Hurricane Fiona, but we did enjoy great participation in the three events that weather allowed. We had great fun with the Bookmobile as a community ambassador at the Gold River Pow Wow and as an entry in the Christmas on the Lahave Parade of Lights in Bridgewater. We also brought the old Bookmobile out of retirement to do month long visits at Aspotogan, Bridgewater Elementary, and New Germany Elementary

It's been an enjoyable and fruitful year and we will continue to build connections in the community and work to meet new and ongoing needs in the year to come.









YEAR TO YEAR COMPARISON
