

The Storm We Made by Vanessa Chan (02 Jan) Malaya, 1945. Cecily's son has disappeared, and her youngest daughter is hidden away to prevent being pressed into service at the comfort stations. Her eldest daughter, who works at a tea house frequented by Japanese soldiers, becomes angrier by the day. Cecily knows that this is her fault. A decade prior, desperate to be more than a housewife, she was lured into a life of espionage, dreaming of an "Asia for Asians." Instead, Cecily helped usher in a brutal occupation by the Japanese. Ten years later, her actions have caught up with her and she will do anything to save her family.

The Djinn Waits a Hundred Years by Shubnum Khan (09 Jan) Akbar Manzil was once a grand estate off the coast of South Africa. Now it stands in ruins: a boardinghouse for misfits. Until Sana; she and her father are the latest tenants and she finds herself drawn to the history of the mansion. To the East Wing, and a locked door, unopened for decades. Behind the door is a bedroom frozen in time, with faded photographs and the diary of a young woman named Meena who died mysteriously a hundred years ago. Watching Sana from the shadows is a grieving djinn who once loved Meena and has haunted the mansion since her death. Obsessed with Meena's story, Sana digs into the past, dredging up secrets that will change the lives of everyone at Akbar Manzil.

Where You End by Abbott Kahler (16 Jan)
When Kat Bird wakes up from a coma, she sees her mirror image: Jude, her twin sister. Jude's face and name are the only memories Kat has from before her accident. As Kat tries to relearn her history and identity, she trusts Jude will provide the answers. But as the months progress, Kat begins to fear that Jude is lying to her. Growing up in an isolated cult, the girls studied poetry and literature—but also played dangerous games of cunning and savagery, games with dark lessons that followed them into adulthood. Now, with Kat's mind as a blank slate, Jude invents an idyllic childhood in the hope of erasing this history, and all the threats it still holds.

The Bullet Swallower by Elizabeth Gonsalez James (23 Jan) In 1895, Antonio Sonoro is a ruthless man, but he's out of money and options. When he hears about a train full of gold he sets off for Houston, with his brother Hugo, to rob it. But when the heist goes awry and Hugo is killed, Antonio finds himself on a quest for revenge that endangers not only his life, but his soul. In 1964, Jaime Sonoro is Mexico's most renowned actor and singer. But his life is disrupted when he discovers a book that purports to tell the entire history of his family. And when the same mysterious figure from Antonio's timeline shows up in Mexico City, Jaime realizes that he may have to pay for his ancestors' crimes, unless he can discover the true story of his grandfather Antonio, the legendary bandido El Tragabalas, The Bullet Swallower.

A Love Song for Ricki Wilde by Tia Williams (06 Feb) Ricki Wilde has many talents, but being a Wilde isn't one of them. As the impulsive, artistic daughter of a powerful Atlanta dynasty, she's the opposite of her socialite sisters. Ricki knows that somewhere, a different, more exciting life awaits her. When a regal nonagenarian invites her to rent the bottom floor of her Harlem brownstone, Ricki jumps at the chance for a fresh start. One evening in February as the heady scent of night-blooming jasmine fills the air, Ricki encounters a handsome, deeply mysterious stranger who knocks her world off balance in the most unexpected way.

The Fox Wife by Yangsze Choo (13 Feb)

Manchuria, 1908. A young woman is found frozen in the snow. Her death is clouded by rumors of foxes involved, which are believed to transform themselves into beautiful women and men. Bao, a detective with a reputation for sniffing out the truth, is hired to uncover the dead woman's identity. Meanwhile, a family that owns a famous Chinese medicine shop can cure ailments, but not the curse that afflicts them—their eldest sons die before their twenty-fourth birthdays. When a mysterious woman enters their household, their luck seems to change. Or does it? Is their new servant a simple young woman or a fox spirit bent on her own revenge?

Sun of Blood and Ruin by Mariely Lares (20 Feb) In 1500s New Spain, witchcraft is punishable by death, temples have been destroyed, and tales of mythical creatures have become whispers. Behind a mask, Pantera uses her magic and sword skills to fight the Spanish rule. Leonora de Las Casas Tlazohtzin is respectable, law-abiding, and faints at the sight of blood. No one suspects that Leonora and Pantera are the same person. Despite her mastery, she is destined to die young in battle, as predicted by a seer. But the legendary Pantera is destined for more than an early grave, and once she discovers the truth of her origins, not even death will stop her.

Heartless Hunter by Kristen Ciccarelli (20 Feb) ■◆■ In the aftermath of a revolution, witches have been diminished from rulers to outcasts ruthlessly hunted, and Rune must hide what she is. Spending her days pretending to be a vapid young socialite, Rune spends her nights as a vigilante who rescues her kind from being purged. When a rescue goes wrong, she decides to throw the witch hunters off her scent and gain intel she needs by courting the handsome Gideon, a witch hunter loval to the revolution, who she can't help but fall for. Gideon loathes the decadence Rune represents, but when he learns the vigilante has been using Rune's merchant ships to smuggle witches out of the republic, he inserts himself into her social circles by pretending to court her back. She feels like his perfect match, except, what if she's the very villain he's been hunting?
